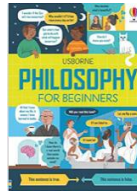
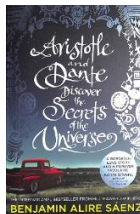

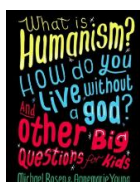
Aristotle and Dante discover the secrets of the universe. Author: Benjamin Alire Sáenz.
