Dear Parent / Carer,

Tying in with Valentine's Day, this week's assemblies have been delivered by Mrs Sutton and the Eco-Council, on the theme of Stewardship and 'Loving your Planet'. All students also had 'Standards' assemblies this week, reminding them about the College's core values and expectations, including arriving at school promptly, with the correct equipment. Whilst recognising that the vast majority of our students 'get it right' most of the time, we also clarified what the consequences there are for those who don't. As mentioned in last week's newsletter, we have reminded all students about our rules regarding mobile phones - they are not to be seen or heard during the College day. This helps students to focus on learning, and also gives them a 'tech break' – time when they're not being messaged or distracted, and don't feel pressure to be constantly connected. It also means that there is less risk of phones getting lost, damaged or stolen. If mobile phones are seen or heard during the College day, they will be confiscated and put into the safe, for a parent, carer or responsible adult to pick up. We have also explained to students that this applies to students wearing ear-phones or pods – if they are walking around College wearing ear-phones, their phone will also be confiscated.

The Sixth Form visit to the clinic in India has departed today, and thank you to everyone who has donated to the gift appeal. Mrs Garvey and the rest of the party have taken bags full of stationery and toys, to give to the children in Varasanadu. The Science trip to Geneva and CERN is also underway, returning tomorrow.

This half-term has been a busy one, and this week has been no exception. As well as the staff accompanying the young people to India and Geneva, thank you to Mrs Heaton for the PTA Tubing trip, the History Faculty for the Year 9 trip to the Imperial War Museum, Mr Howells for the Apprenticeship Fair and Mr Blades for the Year 10 & 11 Macclesfield Pledge event.

A world where peace is built with justice,


And justice is guided by love.

Year 9 History Trip to the IWM

On Wednesday 12th February, 68 Year 9 students and staff travelled to the Imperial War Museum North to find out more about life in Nazi Germany. The trip was organised to support and enhance the Word War Two unit students are currently working on in history. Our students had the chance to tour the main exhibition area and watched one of the informative films, about life on the home front, broadcast hourly in the museum. The highlight of the visit was an educational workshop looking at how the Nazi government, its ideology and laws impacted on German citizens, particularly those who were Jewish. There was also the chance for students to learn how German citizens acted upon the ideology of the Nazis, for example learning about individuals who joined the SS and were found guilty of war crimes in 1945. Students had the chance to handle artefacts and discuss case studies of such German citizens. The students enjoyed the day and felt it beneficial to their understanding of the what it was like to live through the war years in Germany. Public Health Advice to Schools regarding Coronavirus

Dear Headteacher,

Cheshire East Council has received a number of inquiries from schools regarding the issue of families with children returning from holidays overseas and the potential risk of spreading coronavirus.

This communication is to advise headteachers, governors and parents to refer to Department of Health guidance which is regularly updated.

There are two specific circumstances to consider:

The **first** is where a family member is unwell following return from a trip overseas to one of the heightened risk countries (see below).

In this case the family should <u>not</u> bring their child into school but seek advice from the freephone helpline NHS 111.

The **second** circumstance is where a family has returned from one of the heightened risk countries but have <u>no</u> symptoms of illness. It may be helpful for the family to seek guidance from NHS 111, but they can return to school.

We would emphasise NHS advice to encourage people to adopt good hand hygiene and good respiratory hygiene to prevent the risk of infection and a 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach to coughs and sneezes.

Public Health England advice to travellers:

Travellers from Wuhan and Hubei Province

If you have travelled from Wuhan or Hubei Province to the UK in the last 14 days you should immediately:

- Stay indoors and avoid contact with other people as you would with the flu
- Call NHS 111 to inform them of your recent travel to the area

Please follow this advice even if you do not have symptoms of the virus.

Travellers from other parts of China and other specified areas

This advice applies to travellers who have returned to the UK from the following areas:

- China
- Thailand
- Japan
- Republic of Korea
- Hong Kong
- Taiwan
- Singapore
- Malaysia
- Macau

If you have returned to the UK from any of these areas in the last 14 days and develop symptoms of cough or fever or shortness of breath, you should immediately:

- · Stay indoors and avoid contact with other people as you would with the flu
- Call NHS 111 to inform them of your recent travel to the country.

Please follow this advice even if your symptoms are minor.

What this means in practice:

We are asking people to take simple, common-sense steps to avoid close contact with other people as much as possible, like they would with other flu viruses.

This means remaining at home for 14 days after arriving from Wuhan or Hubei Province (or elsewhere in China if you have symptoms) and not going to work, school or public areas.

Where possible, you should avoid having visitors to your home, but it is ok for friends, family or delivery drivers to drop off food.



6th Form News: Apprenticeship Fair



Several of our former sixth form students, along with some other local companies, joined us this week to promote the apprenticeships that they are currently on. They set up stalls and spent times with some of sixth form students as well as some interested year 11s. The students were able to ask about the content of courses, types of roles available as well as finding out about the qualifications on offer.

As part of the day Ellie, from Manchester
Metropolitan University introduced the concept of
degree apprenticeships and explained the process
in terms of applying. Ellie talked through some of
the big companies, like AJ Bell and Astra Zeneca,
that offer degree apprenticeships, but also
highlighted that a number of smaller local

companies, such as Peaks and Plains, offer them.

Anna in Year 13 was pleased to have learnt about all the different types and levels of apprenticeships, 'I'm keen to gain an apprenticeship in retail. I'm not sure the degree apprenticeship will be for me, but I would definitely consider some of the higher apprenticeships.'

'The police stand was really interesting. It is really varied with opportunities to take on challenges such as an advanced driving course.' said Ellie, Year 13, 'it was great to get good information particularly about the progression available in the police force. They were also able to explain the application process. I will definitely apply.'



Our Year 11 students were particularly interested in the NHS. Katie, Year 11 was 'really pleased to hear that you can do an apprenticeship in nursing, I had no idea there were so many job roles in the NHS'. Harry, Year 11 was the best prepared student there, lots of the exhibitors commented on how well informed he was and how it made a real difference to the quality of the conversations that he had.

Mr Intihar, one of our parents, representing Trolexx Ltd, commented 'I have to say they [the students] all came across very well and were asking well informed questions, one girl [Lauren, Year 12] in particular seemed to be very interested in the business and doing some form of work experience with us.'



Former student Georgia, from Peaks and Plains said, 'It was good to see that the school is actively looking to support students who may want to go down the apprenticeship route.' It was great to see how successful Georgia has been. Through the scheme she has completed a Masters degree and now has a permanent job with Peaks and Plains.

We will look to host a similar event next year, but hopefully with even more companies to give students the best possible experience. We are hugely grateful to all the companies who allowed their employees to come, and to all the exhibitors for taking the time to speak with our students. Here at All Hallows we believe that it is important for students to explore all of the avenues open to them and help them make the right decision for them and their future.




The upcoming holiday is the perfect time to curl up with a book. Below are some suggestions to help you find the perfect read.

The digital world that we live in can be a minefield for families and parents/carers. The way in which children 'game' now is completely different to how modern day parents and carers would have experienced. The 'monetization' of gaming is at the forefront of research and there are increasing concerns surrounding online gaming and the subsequent links this has with underage gambling.



From ONLINE GAMING to ONLINE GAMBLING

Recognising the Signs




10 Signs for Parents to Look For:

Disordered gambling is sometimes referred to as the 'silent killer'.
Unlike drug or alcohol addictions the signs are sometimes harder to
spot and if not dealt with at an early age can have a devastating
effect on both the gambler and their families later on in life.



This can lead to increased isolated behaviour and lying about the amount of time spent online.



If a child is willing to spend money online (invariably on a parent's card) without permission then this should act as an early warning sign to parents to ensure that there are some barriers and parental controls in place.

3 CHANGES IN BEHAVIOUR

2

Children may become moody, aggressive or argumentative particularly during or shortly after periods of online gaming.

A CHANGE IN ATTITUDE TO SCHOOL

Children may display an obvious change in attitude to learning and a more negative view of school.

5) DISENGAGED WITH FAMILY LIFE

Children start to prefer spending time alone online

6) COMPULSIVE EATING

This includes both eating the wrong types of food excessively and not eating healthily.



Children might not be prepared to wait for anything (mirrored in excessive online game play and in app purchases) and nothing is ever good enough.

(8) 'THE LOOK'

Compulsive gamblers are often said to look zoned out, have a greyness, loo ill, experience a loss of weight and stop taking pride in their appearance. Th

OBSESSIVE BEHAVIOUR

Children who demonstrate obsessive behaviour in everyday life are often reported to be 'at risk' of developing an online gaming disorder.

10) DISHONESTY

This could include starting to tell lies and in the more extreme cases even stealing things.

10 Top Tips for Parents:

If you think that your child may be at risk of developing a gaming addiction then there are a series of measures that you can put in place. This is by no means an exhaustive list but just some strategies that could ensure a potential situation does not escalate.

BE AWARE

Do not fall into the trap that it's just what children do – as parents/carers/families be on the same page' and do not be allowed to be played off against one another.

DO YOUR RESEARCH

Although both gaming/gambling addictions are now recognised as a mental disorder, some doctors may not be experts in these areas – families can self-refer to NHS Gaming and Gambling Clinics.

VISIT THE GP

See what help and support is available. Visit

SPEAK TO THE SCHOOL

Have an open and honest conversation. Schools are investing heavily in mental health and can arrange or direct you to the most appropriate support services.

TAKE AN ACTIVE INTEREST

This applies to school work and in creating a learning environment at home. Find activities and hobbies that create a life away from the screen and be part of it.

BECOME THE EXPERT

Research the game your child is playing -

PUT BARRIERS IN PLACE

Set up parental controls for all devices (including phones) and set up screen time. Visit the 'Partnership with Parents' section at www.gamfam.co.uk for further details.

FINANCIAL CONTROLS

Turn off in-app purchases on games and make sure your credit/debit card isn't attached to the console your child is playing on. Do not link your debit/credit cards to your child's device and use a prepaid debit card instead. For example Monzo, Go Henry, Nimbl or speak to your bank for advice.

DISCUSS LOOT BOXES AND SKIN BETTING

Have a conversation about loot boxes and skin betting. Many games can still be played and completed without using loot boxes on the console version but be mindful of the mobile versions.

DO NOT LEND MONEY FOR GAMBLING

Or if you think it will be used for online gaming, without your permission.


